



St. Mark's C of E Junior School Parent Survey – January 2022 – The Results


We were delighted with how many parents were able to spare a few moments to complete this survey.

Thank you – this provides is with really important information which will inform the ways in which we can continue to provide the best educational experiences for your child.




97% of parents agree that our school is a welcoming place. A member of SLT (Senior Leadership Team) is on the playground every morning to ensure your child receives a warm welcome to school with teachers and SLT on the playground at the end of the day for any queries. Please do make sure you introduce yourself if you haven't already.


When safe to do so, we aim to hold more events to enable all parents to feel welcome and informed regularly through the school year.




94% confirm that their child is happy at school. We would of course like 100% of our children to feel happy at St Mark's. If your child is unhappy, please arrange to see your child's class teacher or a member of SLT and we will ensure your child is supported to feel more settled. Each class has 'Good to Talk' boxes which is another way of letting the teacher know that something is bothering them.




96% of children feel safe at our school. For children to learn well, they do need to feel safe. We will continue to work with all children to ensure they feel safe at all times but if you or your child are worried about anything at all, please do not hesitate to contact myself or a member of SLT.




97% agree that their child is well looked after. We are pleased with such a high proportion but concerned that 3 families feel otherwise. All of our staff are wholeheartedly committed to ensuring that your children's needs are met and that they feel valued and cared for. Our open door policy is for all families; do raise your concerns with your child's class teacher or SLT at any point.




86% agree that children are equipped to achieve the very best in school life. We very much believe that personal development and academic achievement go hand in hand and we are continuing to find ways to build both of these aspects in to the provision for our children. We know that the impact of the pandemic has been extensive for many children so the balance of support and challenge in learning is an important one to get right. We are continually developing our curriculum & refining our teaching and learning approaches to ensure each child achieves their very best. 
We are pleased that 95% of parents feel informed about their child's learning. Curriculum maps and letters are sent home at the start of each term and more information about our curriculum can be found on the school website. Shortly, we will be publishing progression grids for each subject on the website to show how your child's knowledge builds through the year.




63% agree that the school gives children with additional needs the support they require. We pride ourselves on identifying need quickly and putting the right provision in place for each child. Staff have received recent training on how to identify types of additional need and we are confident that the systems for SEN provision are robust. 
85% agrees that we make sure that the children are well behaved. We do indeed have high expectations for our children and we work hard to address any poor behaviour that impacts on the wellbeing or learning of others. Our Behaviour and Character Development policy has recently been reviewed and can be viewed on the school website. We believe this outlines a robust approach and we will continue to ensure its consistent application for all children.




48% agree that the school deals with bullying concerns quickly and effectively. 47% have reported not to know. This high figure may suggest that some parents are not aware of the measures we take to address bullying concerns. We will therefore explore ways in which this can be more clearly communicated to both children and parents. 


83% agree that the school has high expectations of the children. We are aware that it appears that this is not always communicated effectively to some parents. If you have any concerns that your child is not being challenged to achieve their best, please contact your child's class teacher.




84% agree that the school lets you as parents know about how well your child is doing. We appreciate your comments in relation to the impact Covid has had on how we are able to do this. However, we very much hope to begin parent events such as 'book looks' and Parent Pop-Ins soon. This together with interim reports and parent evenings, we hope will enable you to feel more informed about your child's progress.








81% agree that children's wider personal development is supported. Personal development at St Mark's is about fostering sense of selfworth and security in who we are and who we hope to become; to develop a moral compass, to build positive relationships and make a difference to the lives of others and in the world around us. It is part of our curriculum provision as well as our ethos. We hope that as the children's progress through St Mark's, evidence of opportunities to develop personally will continue to increase.




91% of parents believe that there is a wide range of extra-curricular opportunities available. Unfortunately, due to staffing limitations, we are unable to run FACE clubs during the school day, but have endeavoured to provide a varied programme of after school and lunchtime clubs instead.




We are aware of how crucial Wrap Around provision is for our families and pleased that needs can be met in this way by the SMOOSC (St Mark's Out Of School Club) team. As you will know SMOOSC is an independent company; the staff are not employed by the school. However, we are keen to continue working with SMOOSC to ensure the provision for St Mark's families is good and that the children are well catered for.






95% confirm that the school has a clear vision and associated Christian values. It is crucial that this is communicated clearly to all stakeholders as the vision informs all that we do at school. 
86% agree that the values we explore at school contributes to their child's personal and spiritual development. Our FACE values are woven throughout all areas of school life: **Forgiveness** in our relationships, **Aspiration** in our learning, acting with **Compassion** towards others and **Engaging** with each opportunity to bring the best out of each other. We are currently building further opportunities for children to explore how these shared values (inclusive for those who have a faith or not) can be identified throughout the curriculum, contributing further to their personal and spiritual development.




We are pleased that 73% know that Collective Worship is important in the life of the school. Due to the impact of Covid, we have needed to gather in smaller groups, on-line or outside; we have missed the sense of 'community' that gathering as a whole school brings. However, Collective Worship has still remained a very important aspect of school life albeit, feeling slightly different to usual. We are developing the website to reflect more of what we do in Collective Worship and we hope to soon to invite parents in to join us on occasions too.




68% are aware that children are given opportunities to for prayer and reflection during the school day. We see times of stillness and quiet a crucial part of children's experiences. As such, we have invested in the Learnful programme: daily opportunities to practice mental and emotional wellbeing. Prayer at school is always invitational and never an 'expectation'.




85% is confident that their child has a good understanding of Christianity. We follow the Gloucestershire Agreed Syllabus for our RE teaching; a syllabus used by most schools (Cof E schools & Non CofE) in the county. Therefore the content of Christianity taught in relation to other world faiths is in-line with all other schools using this programme. We are confident that our teaching of Christianity, as part of the wider curriculum, is strong and will continue to ensure your child's progress in this subject is communicated clearly.



85% confirms that their child has a developing understanding of other world faiths. We regard the teaching of all major world religions and world views as a key part of our curriculum to enable children to ask the 'Big Questions' of life and to practise the skill of empathy and respect for the opinions of others. The curriculum time given to this is in-line with the Gloucestershire Agreed Syllabus, as mentioned above.




We are hugely encouraged that 94% of our parents are aware that we have strong links with the church. We are working closely with the church to find more and more ways of serving the needs of our community.

My child has lots of access to various clubs and music lessons etc (the new coding club is brilliant!).

It would be great to see further opportunities for children to learn 'life skills' such as cooking and first aid	As Covid restrictions ease, we will be able to build these opportunities back into the curriculum. First Aid training for all children has been booked for June 2022.
Homework in preparation for Secondary School	Some comments asked for less homework, some for more! Whilst this remains to be a tricky balance to get right, we will explore how our homework provision enables children to prepare further for secondary school. This could include increased online (optional) provision.
More Extra Curricula / Sports Clubs / return of FACE Clubs	This year we have increased our after school and lunch-time club provision. Unfortunately, we do not have enough staff to run FACE clubs effectively, in school time. As Covid restrictions ease, inter-school sports tournaments will become more regular.
Consistency of communication – sometimes dates on the website and newsletters do not always correlate	We take this on board and will continue to work hard to iron out any discrepancies!
It feels too heavily 'Christian' – is there a balance in the exploration of other faiths as well as Christianity?	I am delighted that many families have commented on the vision and the values of the school being a strength. We fully recognise that we are a school, serving the community, for those with faith and of none. With this is mind we have deliberately chosen school values that can be shared across all belief systems and are fundamentally inclusive. Prayer is always invitational; we encourage children to engage with challenging questions and to explore of their own ways of living, believing and thinking. As a Church of England school, by law, we must fulfil the requirements as set out by the Church of England Education Office. The content of RE teaching is also stipulated as Christianity taking 50% of the RE Curriculum time. Other major world faiths and world views (including Humanism) are also a very important part of the curriculum.
